Our 'love' story starts in 1976. Diana and I were new into Brighton and to American Express, with four- and six-year-old kids, when the DWG 'positivity blanket' hit us. Yes, Withdean stadium every weekend; 'let the kids do some running and then use their bikes-you and Diana run round the track with the rest of us – 100-meter dashes, slow jogs, etc, etc'. In 1977 our family joined the Amex team to take-on the Hyde Park 'fun' run, something that continued to 1981. Then there were the half marathons! Not only! - DWG 'invited' me regularly to his testosterone gym next to King Alfed pool. Sweaty bodies lifting outrageous free weights whilst I cowered in the corner awaiting my allotted time to remove most of the weights from the bar to do my bit!

Little did I know just how influential DWG would continue to be in our family's life and my business career.

The immediate Facebook outpouring of sympathy, thanks, recognition, respect, testimonials further give witness to the part that DWG played in those heady Amex days.

DWG was a service disciple and defined the customer as the centre of the universe, but recognized that professionally trained, confident, supported staff, having proper systems and procedures were the key ingredients to making excellence the Amexco 'raison d'etre'.

A Canadian, with a European heart, DWG led his followers to spread the word and actions all over the Amex EMEA world. A passion for excellence was matched by a passion for making life fun and healthy! His reward was to see others succeeding. If people did their best, then that worked for DWG.

One night a dedicated UK team found comfort in doing a three-legged race, after midnight, along 'Montmarte' in Northern Paris, having been entertained by a blind pianist, an eighty-year-old ex-Moulin Rouge dancer, and a deaf drummer! and more than adequate local brew!! (who remembers Maggie Brighton and Steve Moss – the winners that night!!).

He was an accomplished musician and I remember being blown away by the Griffiths quartet with his children Gareth and Stef, and Michele. Such special times.

In the early nineties I followed him to the then Midland Bank (at the same time as the take-over by HSBC). A 'clash' between the titans of Asia and Europe – Asia won! He was responsible for the whole card business and attempted to take the customer excellence spirit into the heart of a failing high street bank culture, stuck in the days of greatness. Miracles were performed. My story relaunches in 2019 when I rediscovered DWG during his retirement, this time in Poitiers, a nice city in western France. He was a regular golfer and would be participating in local club tournaments , still always trying to do things better. Shopkeepers and shoppers alike all knew him and shared smiles and jokes. His music, pipe and free-weights were conveniently located in his home. We drank wine and reminisced; proudly sharing the life stories of our children and their children. I think his mind was at rest and that he must have been proud of what he had achieved and knowing that he had touched so many lives in such a positive way.

He passed away this week, in his sleep at hospital in Poitiers, having had health issues for a few months. His immediate family (Michele, Gareth, Steph, and one grandson from each of his children) will be at the cremation, in Poitiers, on 30th October 2023. He will be fondly remembered by so many people that his energy and compassion had touched over so many years.

Life's Lessons (Andy Rolling)

I attended the Amex Reunion recently and was incredibly lucky to meet-up with Andy. In a very dignified way, he provided the very noisy gathering with some 'pearls of wisdom.' Despite the noise and basic ...system, he persevered. Being the true gentleman that he is, he also stayed with us and shared snacks – despite suffering from a sore throat.

My first observation about life was when I was 11 years old and I realised how hard mum and dad had to work to bring up my brother and myself, so to help out we were given household chores to help mum, and garden and allotment duties to help dad. With my love of football embedded in my life, the time had now come when I realised I needed my first pair of football boots. The answer was, 'you need to get a job'!!

I didn't take that in a negative way, but on my journey in life it was mum and dads way of giving me a work ethic and if you want something that much you've got to be prepared to work for it!

My love for football grew and I was fortunate enough to be offered an apprenticeship at Norwich City FC. I was standing on the platform of Bristol railway station, saying goodbye to mum and dad at the age of fifteen.

My dad offered some farewell wishes to take with me....

- 1. When somebody older than you talks to you, listen, because you will learn something.
- 2. You only get out of life what you put into it.
- 3. There's two words that you never want to say to yourself....

"What's that dad?", "If Only"

and to this day, I've kept that in mind and they have been instrumental in making a lot of decisions.

My football journey continued with a 3 year apprenticeship and hopefully a professional contract would be offered to me at the end of this period.

During those 3 years I did everything and more that the coaches and ground staff told me to do. If I had not followed these instructions I'm sure the words of wisdom..."If Only" would have come back to haunt me.

I do believe this gave me the opportunity to secure a professional contract.

Brian Clough was the manager at Brighton and signed me in 1974, telling me it was the best thing I had done, and without doubt it was the best decision I made in my footballing career.

My playing career under Brian Clough was short lived as he resigned as manager two weeks after signing me.

Moving forward, I had six great seasons at Brighton and Hove Albion...the last four under Alan Mullery which were the best in my career, securing promotions from the old 3rd division to what is now the premiership.

While I was on the final part of my journey in football, which meant working my way down through the divisions, I found myself playing in the Sussex County league at the age of 42....apart from fulfilling my desire to play as long as I could, I loved the game so much I didn't want to stop.

It also gave me the opportunity to pass on all the experience I had gained throughout the years to my younger team mates who were starting out on their journey into football.

Hoping the impact of Dads words would leave a lasting impression on them as it did with me..."When somebody older than you talks to you....listen because you will learn something"

Finally, when I was asked if I would like the opportunity to be part of the hospitality team at the Amex stadium, there was never any chance of an "If Only" moment here, I said Yes without giving it a second thought, and here I am twelve years on loving every minute of my time at the Amex, watching an incredible team play fantastic football and the chance to catch up with so many supporters, young and old.
