# **The Italian Reunion (Editor)**

Imagine my excitement; an opportunity to share an afternoon with dear colleagues from my Italian secondment, 1984-1989. The place, La Cascina, Rome, the occasion, Christmas; the date, 30<sup>th</sup> November, 2024.

The restaurant is located on the via Tuscolana, (near to the GRA, the M25 equivalent), about twelve kms from the centre of Rome. We found an unbelievably cheap flight from Gatwick, minimum hand luggage only, flying on 29<sup>th</sup> November. Our second decision was to find a reasonably priced hotel, near to the centre but easily accessible to public transport routes to the restaurant. My wife,

Diana, found us a place near to Piazza di Porta San Giovanni. It is about 40kms from Fiumicino Airport.— Unfortunately, she contracted this horrible flu-like bug and so had to remain in UK.

OK, 'flying solo,' but I was up for it. First blip, however, was that the Rome public services announced that there would be a oneday strike on 29th November – sh... As time got closer, there were more positive messages advising that the Government had negotiated with the unions (and threatened heavy fines for strikers) and so the strike would be limited to four hours. Only in Italy! I arrived at about 18.00 and whisked my way down the one kilometre walk to the train ticket office. I tried to use the automatic ticket machine but failed. I walked gingerly over to the ticket office and bought the tickets. A 40-minute journey in a posh, multitier, express train in prospect. But no! The train unions felt that a one-day strike was what was needed and so no trains. Not to worry, a replacement bus service was available – you know how those work in the UK- try negotiating the same in a dark evening in a foreign country, where the strike notice had only been announced in the past few hours. Back to the airport to seek out the location of the Roman chariots that would be taking me near to my hotel. A polite travel assistant pointed me to a near empty coach parked a distance from, seemingly, the travel hub. I showed my ticket to the driver who shrugged his shoulders and invited me into the empty coach. I used the 'down' time to check my Google Maps app, only to discover that the bus journey will take at least two hours and then a twenty-minute walk. Some time later, we start our journey (it is now 19.30). A navigator gentleman also boarded, and he chatted with the driver, and, occasionally pointed in the direction needed to be taken. After a long journey, following the train line route, we arrived at via Ostiense (some 13kms from my paid-for destination) when the driver announces that this is his final stop. This was already a two-hour coach journey. A quick check into my app I see that there is no direct public transport route to my hotel and that a combination of metro and bus would take at least another hour and a half – but no buses. Losing the will to live I decide that further investment was needed and so found a taxi to take me the rest of the journey to the hotel. I arrived at 22:00, twenty euros poorer, but grateful.

No strikes on the 20th, so things can only get better!

Reunion day- a good night's sleep and even more invigorated by an unscheduled visit to an Italian barber shop. All was good. No chances taken on transport as I organised for a taxi to take me to the restaurant.

I arrived at 12:30, for a 13:00 lunch appointment. The restaurant was enormous, round in design, divided into two semi-circular sections. I was directed to the Amex designated half, neatly laid out with several large round tables encircling a rectangular table in the centre. I was first to arrive, (English) so waited patiently for my colleagues of forty years ago to arrive. How would I recognise them?

The first gentleman of a certain age arrives, and we politely exchange names, me with my rusty Italian. He explains that he was employed from the 1970's and, like me hadn't had contact from many years. Several more people arrive, and we politely exchange greetings- I had no idea who these people were but did the usual' how are you, how is the family' shallow conversation, without referring to their names – as I didn't know who they were.

Eventually, a lady walks in who recognises me ( I was the only non-Italian employed in the early years). She graciously tells me her name and asks if I remember her. I had to admit 'no.' She, of course, speaking to me in English-how embarrassing. She then looks at the assembled group and just confirms that we are attending the ex-Amex reunion. They all laugh, shake their heads, as they were not ex-employees and , in fact, were attending a different reunion. They walk off, and we are down to three! Eventually, the 'real' colleagues arrive and amass to over fifty people. I, having learnt my lesson, stayed close to each person arriving to hear their names when being greeted by other colleagues'!

I am pleased to say that, after a couple of prosecco's, I was able to enjoy immensely the reunion, and it was so beautiful to spend a few quality hours with people who made such a brilliant contribution to my business life all those years ago. And we shared fond memories of events and dear colleagues, unfortunately, no longer with us.

Needless to say, that travel 'blip' became just a slight impediment compared to the reward of meeting so many lovely people.

# **Books at Christmas! (Editor)**

Thought I'd give an update on my current active library for your information. It is very varied!

**Tim Harford, 'How to Make the World Add Up**. It's a Times Book of the Year-This is a book about statistics, and how to understand them better.

**Catherine Ashton, 'And Then What'**-What does a diplomat actually do? Ashton takes us behind the scenes of major crises in Ukraine, Iran and more to reveal how modern- day diplomacy really works. So much of modern-day diplomacy still takes place behind closed doors, away from cameras and prying eyes. So, what does this vital role really look like in today's world – and what does it take to do it well?

**Misha Glenny, 'Dark Market'** draws on interviews, court records and website archives to craft this chronicle of a new and invisible form of crime made possible by the Internet. Unlike ordinary criminals, identity thieves, credit-card fraudsters and other cyber criminals engage in activities that are virtual, transnational and so technical in nature that they are difficult to prove in court. By 2004, with most countries and companies taking a haphazard approach to network security, sophisticated criminals were stealing millions from institutions worldwide. Glenny's main focus is Dark Market, which became the world's top English-language cybercrime site, a digital "supermarket" that sold stolen identities and credit-card data that cost the banking industry tens of millions.

**Anne Applebaum, 'Autocracy Inc,'** the Pulitzer Prize-winning historian takes account of the financial institutions and trade deals that have helped spread tyranny across the world.

**Dr.Maggie Aderin-Pocock, 'Webb's Universe,'** The book is structured into three sections - the first is about the telescope itself, beginning with its predecessors, including, for instance, some interesting material on the pros and cons of using a Lagrange point for a telescope. The second looks at Webb's mission - what it's intended to capture and how it will do that. And the last section, around twice as big as the other two added together, takes us through the already impressive range of Webb imagery. **However, the most fascinating author's work I have found recently is that of Timothy Snyder**; his latest book being 'On Freedom.'

A prominent historian and author, he often discusses the impact of social media on society and individual relationships, particularly in the context of his book *The Road to Unfreedom* and related writings. He contrasts social media interactions with the depth and authenticity of real-world relationships. Here's a summary of how Snyder might compare them:

1. Superficial vs. Deep Connections

Social media tends to foster superficial connections, often focused on likes, shares, or fleeting interactions. In contrast, real-world relationships require time, effort, and emotional investment, resulting in deeper, more meaningful bonds.

2. Algorithmic Influence

On social media, algorithms prioritize engagement over authenticity, often leading people to interact in ways that are performative or driven by curated content. Real relationships are shaped organically, without the external manipulation of an algorithm.

3. Echo Chambers vs. Open Dialogue

Social media often creates echo chambers where users are exposed primarily to ideas that reinforce their existing beliefs. Real-world relationships, on the other hand, expose individuals to diverse perspectives, fostering empathy and understanding.

4. Loneliness and Fragmentation

Snyder warns that social media, despite its promise of connection, can increase feelings of loneliness and societal fragmentation. Real relationships provide emotional support and a sense of belonging that virtual interactions cannot fully replicate.

5. Political Manipulation and Distrust

Snyder emphasizes how social media can be exploited for political purposes, spreading propaganda or disinformation to undermine trust. Authentic relationships help build trust and resilience against such manipulation.

In summary, Snyder views social media as a tool that can undermine the depth and authenticity of human connections, whereas real relationships are essential for personal growth, trust, and a healthy democratic society.

And, if you really want to immerse yourself, in *On Tyranny: Twenty Lessons from the Twentieth Century*, Timothy Snyder includes a recommended reading list in the appendix. These works serve as historical, philosophical, and literary guides to understanding and resisting authoritarianism. Here are the key recommendations:

- 1. Hannah Arendt
- The Origins of Totalitarianism

A foundational text on how totalitarian regimes arise, focusing on the conditions that lead to fascism and communism.

- 2. George Orwell
- 1984

A classic dystopian novel exploring surveillance, propaganda, and the suppression of truth.

- 3. Václav Havel
- The Power of the Powerless

An essay examining how individuals can resist oppressive regimes through truth and moral integrity.

- 4. Czesław Miłosz
- The Captive Mind

A profound exploration of how intellectuals rationalized their support for communism under oppressive regimes.

- 5. Timothy Snyder's Own Work
- Bloodlands: Europe Between Hitler and Stalin

A detailed history of the atrocities committed in Eastern Europe under Nazi and Soviet rule.

- 6. Other Authors and Texts
- Philip Roth: The Plot Against America

A fictional account of an alternate history where fascism takes root in the United States.

• Leszek Kołakowski: Main Currents of Marxism

A critical analysis of Marxist ideology and its consequences.

• Zbigniew Herbert: The Collected Poems, 1956–1998

Poems offering reflections on history, morality, and resistance.

• Albert Camus: *The Plaque* 

An allegorical novel about resistance to tyranny and the human spirit in the face of oppression.

# Measuring Time / Computing Speeds!
